

- What do you like more/least about your current job (if applicable)?
- Do you want to take on more responsibilities at work?
- Do you want fewer responsibilities at work?
- Do you want to work in a pressure drive environment?
- Do you want to avoid target driven occupations?

2. Things you want / Thing you don't want

5. Join career or job hunting groups on Facebook or LinkedIn

- Facebook and LinkedIn have different job & career hunting groups
- To locate these use the search bar and type words like - career support, career group, job groups, job hunting group, jobs in Belfast, jobs in England, jobs in Scotland, job support groups.
- Look through the different groups, then select one or two and then request to join them. Once approved, you can become part of a community by sharing your job-hunting tips or asking for help.




6. Talk to Family and Friends

- Family and friends often know of an opening in places that they work in or have worked at (networking).
- They can also help to recommend you to potential employers.
- Ask family and friends to identify the skills and abilities that they see in you.
- Skills count and can help influence the type of job or career that you are looking for.



7. Complete some Online Career Assessments

- Online career assessments can be a useful tool for suggestion careers that match your preferences.

9. Analyse job advertisements

- Job advertisements often contain a wealth of information such as –
- the types of duties,
- · names of local employers,
- pay rates,
- personality and work traits,
- skills that you need to do the job,
- qualification and experience requirements.

Read the descriptions, thoroughly

- Are there any positions that you can see yourself doing?
- What are the things attracting you to this job?
- Are their positions you would consider upskilling for?




10. Analyse job categories (sectors)

11. Research Companies

- Conduct some research on the companies that you would like to work


12. Use Google maps or yell.com

- Who are the local companies/employers in your areas?
- Are there any that you would consider working for?
- Look at their recruitment section on their website and read their latest news postings.
- Consider sending them a speculative application
 - CV and cover letter directly to them



13. Try and Test Out

- Consider volunteering or completing a short unpaid placement at an organisation.
- You will need to contact them directly.
- Volunteer Now
- Student Volunteering
- Work Experience
- Reach Volunteering



14. Internships or Temping

- Alternatively, you could look into some type of internship or sign up for temporary paid employment.
- Internships Some organisations offer internships to students.
- Careers advisers at most universities or further education colleges should be able to give you a list of employers advertising internships.



14. Internships or Temping

- Temporary employment can also give you the chance to experience different types of work and you will also get paid for it.

15. Academies

- The academies works with global companies that have current job vacancies available and offers pre-employment training to meet the skills needed for those jobs.
- If you're unemployed, underemployed, or want to change career, the assured skills pre-employment training programme can help you. Academy-style training will help you get a job by giving you the skills that expanding companies want.
- Training allowances
- When you're in a training academy, you:
- will receive a weekly training allowance of £150
- will be reimbursed weekly travel expenses
- may be eligible for child care allowance


